Minichamps Maserati Tipo 61—Carroll Shelby

Originally named Tipo 60 and 61, the Maserati "Birdcage" possessed a revolutionary steel tube frame, which consisted of more than 200 filmy liners. This car owned and developed by the Italian car manufacturer based in Modena, dominated the international race scene especially in the USA throughout the 1960s. Among others Stirling Moss was one of the drivers that piloted the Maserati "Birdcage". This is a replica of the Maserati Tipo 61 from the year 1960, with which the legendary Carroll Shelby took part in the Riverside Examiner GP. Minichamps have made it to 1:18 scale.

Bburago is back and already making new model cars in 1:18 scale. Above is their 2007 Alfa Romeo 8C Competizione, the latest in a long line of sporting Alfas using an eight-cylinder motor. The car started off in 2004 as a concept design, and has finally made it into production with a 450 bhp V8 under the bonnet. Bburago has also released a 2006 Lamborghini Gallardo Spyder, (below) a 520 bhp supercar powered by a V10 engine and loaded with hi-tech gadgetry.



Earlier this year I sent an Email to Hornby Italia referring to possible future production of the big 1:8 scale Pocher model car kits that were available until 2003, when then parent company Lima went into receivership. Hornby purchased Lima and the Pocher dies and nothing has been heard from them since, until now. Hornby's Roberta Gervasi contacted me to say Pocher production is expected to start again within two years, possibly with the Ferrari and Porsche models being first off the line. The classics will be further away but anything can happen in two years. Good news indeed as many model builders have wondered about Pocher models and what became of them. SEPTEMBER MEETING

September = Italian Night = Pizzas!
Continuing our traditional pizza-nights in
September, we again enjoyed a variety of
pizzas from local pizza restaurant Sergios.
John Woodhouse generously volunteered
to do the ordering and pickups for us,
thanks John. The pizzas were as
scrumptious as always and were washed
down with Coke or Solo. The new format
of the evening as trialed last month, saw
members sitting in rows with display
models set up on one side of the room
and work-in-progress (WIP) models on the
other side.

Terry O'Neill began the meeting before handing over to Paul McLennan, who gave a good account of the recent Autochamps model comp'. Paul also hinted at some changes for next year's event. The new format was well accepted by those present with some of the older members heard to say "This is how we did it twenty years ago at the Light Car Club rooms". Some of the members chose to speak about their models before we adjourned for half an hour to enjoy the pizzas. It was during this break that the members took a few minutes to sign a 'get well' card for John Gray, who is recovering at home after recent surgery.

Models on display included Andy Woodhouse' Vespa motor-scooter, looking big 'n bold in purple, built from a 1:9 scale Italeri kit. Andy also showed a recent F1 Ferrari in 1:24 scale by Revell and a racing Yamaha as ridden by Valentino Rossi built from 1:12 scale Heller kit.

Terry O'Neill proudly showed his '35 Fiat Balilla and '30 Alfa 1750, both in gleaming red and both from Polistil in their slightly unusual scale of 1:16.

Tony Scull showed us a collection Ferraris through the sixties, with 250GTs, GTOs, GTBs, a California spyder and a Daytona, all built in the popular 1:24 scale and mainly from Italeri kits.

Craig Baird was another to show Ferraris with display covering most of the scales from 1:12 thru 1:24 to 1:43 and 1:60 (approx').

Paul McLennan was another to show a Ferrari, this was an Enzo, he built from a recent Tamiya kit in 1:24 scale. Paul also showed his trophy winning custom 'Çhopper' based on a 1:12 scale Revell kit and loaded with extra lathe turned aluminium parts. Paul also showed his unfinished (W-I-P) '49 Mercury, a new release from Revell in 1:25 scale. This kit features a lowered or 'çhopped' roofline and other custom features.

Other W-I-P models seen on the table were a '69 Mustang and Sunbeam Tiger, both in 1:24 scale and in primer; maybe we'll see them in colour next month.

Lloyd Cowan's display included Lamborghinis, Ferraris, Maseratis and the three Minis from the film The Italian Job. One of Lloyd's favourite pieces is his 1:43 scale F1 Ferrari signed by Michael Schumacher; Lloyd has several F1 models signed by the drivers but explained that Schumacher is so popular he was very lucky to get the autograph.

Graeme Longmore brought along some of his Bugatti models in 1:43 scale and the magnificent Bugatti Royale Coupe' Napoleon from Franklin Mint in 1:24 scale. Other Italian cars Graeme showed were an early Fiat and a Lamborghini Diablo. Graeme Signorini also showed Lamborghini with his Countach in 1:24 scale from Franklin Mint.

John Templin showed his recently finished 1950 Thames panel van in 1:24 scale, john converted the little van back to a 'street driven' van from the outright dragster base of the kit.

BRABHAM BMW - NELSON PIQUET

Minichamps has announced a 1:18 scale diecast model of Nelson Piquet's 1983 F1 Championship winning car, the Brabham BMW BT52. It has complete engine detail and the upper panel can be removed for inspection purposes. Piquet was the first F1 driver to win a Championship in a turbo engine car. The BT52 had an amazing power output of between 700 and 900 bhp in race or qualifying set-up respectively. Piquet won the 1983 title from Alaine Prost by just two championship points.
